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in the game culture reader editors jason c thompson and marc a ouellette propose that game studies that peculiar multi inter and trans disciplinary field wherein international researchers from such diverse areas as rhetoric computer science literary studies culture studies psychology media studies and so on come together to study the production distribution and

consumption of games has reached an unproductive stasis its scholarship remains either divided as in the narratologists versus ludologists debate or indecisive as in its frequently apolitical stances on play and fandom thompson and ouellette firmly hold that scholarship should be distinguished from the repetitively reductive commonplaces of violence sexism and addiction in other words beyond the headline friendly modern topoi that now dominate the discourse of game studies what issues approaches and insights are being if not erased then displaced this volume gathers together a host of scholars from different countries institutions disciplines departments and ranks in order to present original and evocative scholarship on digital game culture collectively the contributors reject the commonplaces that have come to define digital games as apolitical or as somehow outside of the imbricated processes of cultural production that govern the medium itself as an alternative they offer essays that explore video game theory ludic spaces and temporalities and video game rhetorics importantly the authors emphasize throughout that digital games should be understood on their own terms literally this assertion necessitates the serious reconsideration of terms borrowed from other academic disciplines figuratively the claim embeds the embrace of game play in the continuing investigation of digital games as cultural forms put another way by questioning the received wisdom that would consign digital games to irrelevant spheres of harmless child s play or of invidious mass entertainment the authors productively engage with ludic ambiguities

the first edition of the auditory culture reader offered an introduction to both classical and recent work on auditory culture laying the foundations for new academic research in sound studies today interest and research on sound thrives across disciplines such as music anthropology geography sociology and cultural studies as well as within the new interdisciplinary sphere of sound studies itself this second edition reflects on the changes to the field since the first edition and offers a vast amount of new content a user friendly organization which highlights key themes and concepts and a methodologies section which addresses practical questions for students setting out on auditory explorations all essays are accessible to non experts and encompass scholarship from leading figures in the field discussing issues relating to sound and listening from the broadest set of interdisciplinary perspectives inspiring students and researchers attentive to sound in their work newly commissioned and classical excerpts bring urban research and ethnography alive with sensory case studies that open up a world beyond the visual this book is core reading for all courses that cover the role of sound in culture within sound studies anthropology sociology cultural studies history media studies and urban geography

this reader brings together for the first time key writings about the nineteenth century a key period in contemporary discussion of visual culture exploring such topics as photographs exhibitions and advertising the editors suggest that modernity rather than modernism is a valuable way of understanding the changes particular to the visual culture of the time and they investigate a variety of nineteenth century images technologies and visual experiences with three specially written essays about definitions of visual culture as an object of study the book examines genealogies and introduces key writings about culture from writers living in the nineteenth century itself or from those who scrutinized its visual culture from early in the twentieth century such as walter benjamin and siegfried kracauer the nineteenth century visual culture reader is organized around key themes technologies of vision practices of display and the circulation of images cities and the built environment visual representations of the past visual representations of catagories of racial sexual and social differences spatial configurations of inside and out private and public selections include well known authors and new research by younger scholars to produce a well balanced and comprehensive collection

book reading often seems to function as a barometer of cultural vitality for those who wish to argue that we live in a dumbed down age the alleged decline in book reading often becomes the benchmark of falling cultural standards although pessimistic critics and commentators may shout that the time of the book is over as they have since the fifteenth century millions of readers worldwide are not listening to them despite the allure of television and the internet book reading remains a popular activity however despite the huge global audiences for books it is surprising that the complexity of everyday book culture is not readily comprehended to the apparently simple and perennial question what do people do with books this research offers a sophisticated response that goes beyond the narrow perception that reading is solely the consumption of narrative it combines a number of different academic approaches cultural geography and sociology literary and cultural studies and cultural history in order to better understand the complex nature of readers everyday encounters with their books through the use of an ethnographic method which grounds the analysis firmly in the experience of real embodied readers this work reveals the rich textures of everyday reading culture it demonstrates how seemingly mundane acts of popular reading are in fact complex performances enabled and curtailed simultaneously by three cultural economies the spatio temporal the social and the textual while the consumption of narrative often thought to be an entirely adequate definition of reading remains significant it is only a single element in an everyday reading practice that is as this book shows anything but ordinary

academic writing is rhetorical and culturally conditioned what in one culture appears as effective and proper can in a new cultural context look like chaotic writing and sloppy thinking to discover the ways in which such impressions are made we need careful textual analysis of academic writing in different cultural contexts this book takes a textlinguistic approach and contrasts academic journal articles in a large and dominant culture anglo american a small and peripheral one finnish and the intercultural products of the small culture members writing in the dominant language finns in english the results indicate that

academics do have culture specific writing styles and that textlinguistic tools are crucial if we want to expand our understanding of written communication
